

2021 Western PA United Methodist Conference Report

The Western PA annual conference was held in a hybrid format with a limited number meeting in person at the Erie Bayfront Convention Center Friday, June 18th evening for the ordination and commissioning service and Saturday, June 19th morning. All may view the conference online at www.wpaumc.org.

Just a few of the highlights from Bishop Cynthia Moore-Koikoi's state of the church address:

Identified some of the difficulties that the church encountered due to the covid pandemic from the closing of some churches to how many have left the UM church to go elsewhere or perhaps nowhere.

Some have stopped ministries due to the uncertainty of the future of the UM denomination. Although not new, the resolution to the sexuality issues and perhaps the splitting of the demonination has been delayed again. The general conference is now scheduled to begin 8/29/22 in Minneapolis, MN.

Positives outcomes of the past year are that the church has had to learn how to broaden the access to church services via the internet or even broadcast over the radio for parking lot services. The church rallied to feed and offer clothing to those in need. The conference's At the Lake ministry was highlighted as well as work towards anti-racism.

Due to the departure of Bishop Jeremiah Park from the Susquehanna district, our Bishop Cynthia Moore-Koikoi and Bishop Sandra Steiner Ball of the West Virginia conference will be covering the Susquehanna district together until the next Jurisdictional Conference at the end of 2022.

The financial report was presented by Roger White and Seth McClymonds. Eighty-five percent of the connectional monies was received. Six hundred churches met or exceeded their share. The budget for 2022 is set at 8,276,000. This is 15% lower than the highest income in 2015 of 9.7 million reflecting a 5% decrease in the number of churches. Since 2019, the formula to calculate apportions has been based on the individual church's income and is $\sim 11\%$ of that amount.

Ed Bailey gave a report on the United Methodist Foundation of Western PA which currently has over 141 million dollars. One of the four issues being voted on by this conference was related to merge this foundation to the United Methodist Stewardship Foundation of the Susquehanna Conference for a combined amount of near 200 million that would be managed by our conference. More information of what the Foundation does is available on the website.

Bishop Cynthia gave a warning that there are people who have impersonated her and sent emails out asking for you to buy and send in gift cards or to click on a link to donate money. She states that she would never send out such an email and to please not be fooled by such a scam.

COMMUNITY BREAKFAST

Seneca UMC free Community Breakfast was originally started as a community outreach service project of one of our adult Sunday School classes. Since February of 2020 it has been a collaborative effort of many members of the Seneca congregation.

Held the 3rd Saturday of each month our volunteers serve between 15 and 45 free meals consisting of breakfast meats, potato, eggs, and drinks. We have also tried to have fun each month by offering pancakes or French toast with a variety of fun fruit and syrup toppings.

We also have a lot of people who drop in the dining room to chat and then take the meals to go.
